THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

LEAGUE 1990

It is a privilege at any time: to be President at this unprecedented stage of Blackheath's development - in terms of scale, success, range of our activities - is a heady sensation as well as an honour.

We now have both the prospect of further success and the wide base and resilience to ride out any setbacks. We also seem to have progressive aims in nice balance with the peculiar strength of our roots and tradition. At the same time, we are not complacent as one of the country's foremost athletic clubs: there is an eagerness for progress for new heights.

Each new President remarks on the volume and quality of the support he receives to help him through the year - from everyone, seemingly. This help comes as a wonderful surprise, however much you are told to expect it. Even in the first weeks as I write this, I am grateful,

Not least, of course, our large framework of Club Offices and numerous helpers makes the President's job possible easy, even, in many respects. This should encourage future holders of the office to believe they can hold it at the same time as earning a living. And this must be so if we are not to be wholly restricted to retired men.

There is, too, a substantial argument that our body of office-holders is not large enough for the Club's evergrowing needs - that its size is appropriate for a club of 500 members - insufficient for our 1000 and their broad range of needs

I've always been conscious from my own early days of our good fortune in possessing so many dedicated and gifted officers. I have vivid memories of the welcome I got from President, Summer and Winter Captains and others when I joined Blackheath as a Young Athlete. Despite the difficulties posed by our modern numbers. I hope that everyone will look for every chance to offer such warm approaches to new or young members. For example, we are

perhaps less widely known than they deserve: this list should increase their recognition.

Talking of debts we owe, there are numbers of members and friends of the Club that perform all sorts of services the parents who transport League Teams, for example: we don't take them for granted, either. Thank you.

I'd like to urge the individual Club Member – especially, but not only, the Seniors - to try one or two experiments things you wouldn't normally do. For example:

- go to a Young Athletes fixture, Winter or Summer

- run all three Mob Matches with us: our fastest men can still win points, even if they make it a training run

- help with some activity, however occasionally: fundraising, organising, officiating, recording - don't feel you have to be invited - just turn up and offer your services

- if you are a cross-country, marathon or other road runner, run an intensive quality session of intervals once a

- run at the Norman Park Track once a month

- next Summer compete in Club Meetings: handicaps, "Dream Miles", Championships (yes, you can)

come to one of the many social occasions on offer.

As for longer term thoughts, integration must accompany the expansion, including the effective transition of our champion Young Athletes into Champion Seniors. Ours is a welcoming, social Club - you won't find a better all-round membership anywhere else. Blackheath is the envy of other clubs.

And, on the same theme of integration, now may be the time for an active policy of enlarging membership to embrace Disabled Sports people, in addition to raising funds for them.

To some, Blackheath "Senior Management" may appear remote - old-fashioned, even; it is not. Much radical and daring thought and planning are done by your representatives. A significant proportion of this is, understandably, concentrated on the fund-raising and sponsorship necessary not just for the immediate future but for the years ahead when the attraction of more first-class athletes into Blackheath must play its part in the next great leap forward.

And all this without losing the qualities and strengths the

Club has built up over the past 120 years.

I am grateful for the many approaches and brainwaves I've had already from you. Please use me as a focal point, clearing house for your ideas and suggestions - especially for ways in which we may bring the various sections of Blackheath more closely together, but also for your most adventurous, terrible notions.

This is the start of a crucial phase for us: the next four or five years represent a challenge for us to form one of the strongest Senior teams in the land - in Track and Field as well as over the country. I am glad to be part of this new

SECRETARY'S REPORT 1989/90

Mr. President and Gentlemen.

Thave the honour and pleasure to present the 121st Annual Report of Blackheath Harriers for the year ending 31st August 1990.

I am unable to report another year of all round athletic successes, but good performances were achieved, again notably in the Young Athletes section. It is a period of changes outside the Club's control which are probably of significance to our future and the Club needs to take heed of them. I refer to the protracted formation of BAF (the British Athletic Federation), compulsory competitive tendering for local sports facilities in 1992 and the implications of financial support, I hesitate to use the word professionalism, at club level.

BAF is still ponderously going through its complex phases of formation, with the latest target for completion in February 1991. The effects on the day-to-day administration at club level is unlikely to be very apparent, but with its constitution still seemingly subject to change, nothing is certain.

The current Government policy that Local Authorities should put out services to competitive tendering is spreading to leisure and sports facilities in 1992, with the likelyhood that they will be looking to organisations, such as Blackheath Harriers, to take an active part in the administration of facilities like Norman Park. If this was to come about, the burden on Club Officers would be enormous, but more serious would be the possible need to raise local financing.

The last point to make, which is of immediate consequence, is the filtering down from international levels of professionalism to club levels. This does not only mean the direct financial support of the elite members of the team, but also the more professional and commercial awareness for a modern club to remain at the top.

The thought of this may be quite disturbing to those of us brought up in the amateur days of yesteryear, but as I have said, if we wish to remain at the top of our sport, and I feel sure we all do, then our approach must also become equally professional. To this end, your Committee have authorise a sub-committee, to prepare a promotional package and th initiative to obtain a major sponsor for the Club. Anyon working for, or having contact with a company which migh be worth contacting in this respect, should communicate with Colin Brand. Les Roberts or Bill Wheeler.

I trust you will excuse me for using the Secretary' Report in this way, but I felt it important to stress thespoints and widen the awareness of members to significan changes in our sport, that is of course assuming that other will read this report when printed.

So, on to the Report proper.

Membership has remained steady at just under 1000 with 142 elections being offset by 160 resignations and deletions. Five deaths were notified during the year, with the most recent being that of Past President Peter Stenning President only two years ago. Peter continued to play at active part in Club activities right up to the moment of hideath, as he did with his many other charitable interests, a probable factor in the heart attack which killed him. Othe deaths were those of C.D. "Ted" Purves, who many of us will remember as a permanent part of the Field Events team in the 1950's and 60's, George A.V. Stratford only a member or a few years, but long associated with athletics as a founder member of Wigmore (now Bromley) Ladies, and a well known hurdles coach and timekeeper, A.G. Mills, a member since 1939 and B.P. Braund, a member since 1920.

The Cross Country Relay returned to Sparrows Den after the running at Crystal Palace last year due to a gale blocked course at Hayes. The event continued to be well supported and organised with equal efficiency by John Hills and his team.

The Cross Country season opened by the Club 5, with yet another win for the fast becoming evergreen Richard Coles and the Junior title going to Mark Steinle. Richard also went on to win the Club 7½, but was deprived of a seasons hat trick by Tony Baldock winning the Club 10. The Veterans title was won for the first time by Hugh Morten.

The Mob matches were not a success story with the Nicholls Cup being lost to SLH and the Pelling Ratcliff to Ranelagh. Only Orion were beaten and then by the very

narrowest margin of 15 points.

Our successes in the major Championship races were also disappointing after the promise of the previous season In the Junior and Senior South of the Thames races positions of 12th and 10th respectively were recorded. High hopes of a long awaited team win in the Kent Championships were dashed by illness and injury, but good runs by Spencer Newport (3rd) and Gary Arthey (5th enabled the team to finish in fourth place. Mark Steinle had a fine win in the Boys race with the team 3rd, the Youths were 4th and Juniors 6th.

In the Southern Championships, Jerry Barton was unfortunate to suffer an asthma attack whilst defending his title, but finished 10th and well supported by Alan Guilder 12th, to give a 3rd team placing. Another fine run by Mark Steinle placed him 2nd in the Boys race, and it was pleasing to see a Junior team closing in, even if only 7th.

The National saw a good overall team performance, with Bill Foster in 42nd position well supported for an 11th team place. Matt Lawton and Liam Bulson were creditable 30th and 36th positions in the Junior race, and are both names to note for the future.

On the Veterans scene, the Mob Match against Orion, SLH and Ranelagh resulted in a win for BH, and we also won the V40 age group in the Kent Championships.

Jim Phelan again organised a successful Schools Race although support has diminished in recent years.

Our Water Sport activities were limited to the Maryon Wilson swimming race, this being won by 14 year out Phillip Burch. We were unable to recruit a crew for the Rowing Race, but it is hoped to put this to rights for 1990

Les Roberts, organising the Ted Pepper 7 for the first time, had secured sponsorship from the Buxted Park (Sussex) Hotel and Fitness Centre. A well organised and successful race was won by Nigel Gates of Brighton and Hove, also Manager at Buxted Park, with Jerry Barton 2nd, supported by Mark Colpus 4th and Dave Hassall 9th for a BH team win. After last year's outstanding win, this year's Southern 12-Stage Relay was an anticlimax, when a depleted team none the less finished a creditable 9th. And so to the track and field season.

This followed a similar pattern to the preceding crosscountry season, with only limited successes, but the Young

Athletes were again a shining exception to this.

First the bad news! Our existence in the British League Division 1 has been fairly tense for a few years, and with injuries or unavailability of several of our leading athletes, the inevitable relegation resulted. Despite this, team spirit was good, and the youngsters who were thrown in at the deep end, without exception, performed up to or above expectations. The three Southern League teams all performed steadily throughout the season and finished mid-positions in their respective leagues.

There were of course a few outstanding senior athletes, notably Graham Savory (England) and Darrin Morris (Scotland) finishing 7th and 8th respectively in the Commonwealth Games Discus, Warren Caswell 3rd in the National Indoor Championships High Jump with a pb 2.20, Spencer Newport 3rd in the UK Closed Steeplechase and Nigel Keogh's win in the Irish 400m Hurdles Champion-

ship.

In the Veterans' National Championships there were wins for Peter Hannell in the V45, 3000m Walk, and Bob Minting in the V40, 800m. Bob was also a member of the GB 4 \times 400m Relay squad which won the European Championship.

Now the good news! The Junior sections of the Club swept all before them, winning the Junior Southern League Division 2, Kent Boys and Colt League, Southern Premier Division of the Young Athletes League and topped it all by retaining the National Young Athletes League Final, To mention individuals from such an obvious all round team effort is somewhat invidious, but it would be equally unfair not to single out some outstanding athletes who have achieved honours in other Championships. In the UK Under-20 Championships Juniors, Laurence Rogers was 4th in 400m Hurdles, Jamie Quarry 4th in 110m Hurdles and in the Youths, Jonathan Murray won the 800m. The English Schools saw 2nd places for Rogers and Quarry, and 4th for Jason Mulcahy in the Shot Putt Seniors. In the Inters age group, Murray again won the 800m, Michael Narty was 2nd in the 100m and Andrew Brown was 3rd in the Discus. Rogers, Quarry and Narty were later selected to represent Great Britain in a Junior International. To those I have not mentioned, perseverence is an attribute of all good athletes, so it could be your turn next year.

Another event not strictly in the year covered by this report was the European Junior Clubs Championship, in

Also our Treasurer, John Hill, in trying times: Mike Davies who manages to meet most of the demands for Summer Officials and our Coaching Secretary. Simon Parsons, who somehow copes with up to 80 youngsters on Wednesday coaching evenings. To those not mentioned, on behalf of the Club, thank you.

We should also recognise the continued work undertaken by BHSC, who raise amazing sums of money, all to the benefit of the Club.

BHHQ have had a quiet year, but as reported earlier, are conserving slim resources for possible future major outlays. One major commitment for the Club could be the proposals to develop the cottage in line with the report from the Development Sub-Committee to be given later in this meeting.

An external honour awarded to a Member, was the Companion of the Order of the Bath gained by Philip Critchley in the New Year Honours in recognition for his work in the Department of Transport. Also Trevor Llewelyn has been appointed National Junior Event Coach for High Jump.

An athletics event I was not sure where to slot in was the Triathlon. However it should be recorded that Nick Kinsey set a British Record of 9hrs 5mins 20secs in Ironman of Europe event. That was a 2.4 mile swim, 112 miles cycle and a full marathon in 3hrs 5mins.

Writing my first report has been a daunting task, not for what or how, but for the sheer abundance of material to cover, but at this point, Mr. President, I will close.

BLACKHEATH – DAY BY DAY

Dear Mr Editor,

I wonder if I may, through your publication, explain and clarify some facts of the organization of the Club which we do not seem to generally publicise to new members and they remain in ignorance for some time, if not for ever!

I write, because being ever present at the Club House on a Wednesday evening, I am aware that many people query the need for our various fund-raising efforts, and are not always aware of how their subscriptions are spent to the benefit of the Club as a whole. I would therefore like to help and advise with a little clarification, commencing with our

"spiritual" home:-

BLACKHEATH HARRIERS' CLUBHOUSE – The premises at BOURNE WAY, HAYES is the freehold possession of B.H.H.Q. Ltd., a Company limited by Guarantee, and all members of Blackheath Harriers are ipso facto members of B.H.H.Q. Ltd. The origins of B.H.H.Q. Ltd. go back to 1926 and the purchase and conversion of Club HQ, when the necessary finance was raised by means of a Debenture issue to members. Although these Debentures were paid off by the end of the 1940's it was decided that B.H.H.Q. Ltd. would continue to manage the property thereby enabling the Club committee to concentrate its efforts on athletic matters and not become embroiled in such matters as leaking roofs, blocked loos etc.

The Company is run by a board of Directors who are all members of Blackheath Harriers and are selected at the AGM. The board is responsible for the maintenance of the fabric of the buildings and its surrounds for the benefit and pleasure of all Club members. The Company is the legal entity that had to arrange the finances for the extension to the Club House in the late 1970's. A major proportion of this was raised by a Debenture issue similar to that of 1926.

much of which has still to be paid off.

The main problem for the Directors is the lack of sufficient funds to put everything in perfect order and maintain it at that level. The major income received by the Company is by way of rents, paid by Blackheath Harriers to occupy and use the premises and its surrounds. There is also a payment from the profits of the money raising "200 Group" that is paid to B.H.H.Q. Ltd. to help pay off outstanding loans and Debentures arising from the extension. It will be seen from the foregoing that when major building improvements are contemplated it becomes necessary to appeal for donations from members.

BIACKHEATH HARRIERS is "THE CLUB", and we all pay our annual subscriptions to the Club for whatsoever activity we wish to pursue in the Club. Whether it be Track and Field, Cross-Country, Road or Officiating, or just being part of the Club, with its various pleasures, our monies form the

"purse" from which the Club will be financed.

The Club is managed by "the Committee", who have the ultimate responsibility in deciding how and where our funds should be used, and endeavouring through the Hon. Treasurer to see that everything runs to a budget. When costs escalate beyond the ability of the Club to balance the budget, then due consideration has to be given to increase subscriptions. We do of course receive miscellaneous funds for good results in Leagues and Championships by way of prize-money, by helping at the London Marathon, and the fund raising efforts of various members.

From this Club "purse" is paid the rent and rates, costs of the Gazette and Courier, affiliation fees, Championship entry fees, and expenditure on athletics in general.

One anciliary part of the Club Committee is the Wine Committee, appointed from the membership of the general Committee. Within the frame-work of the Club Rules, it is the responsibility of the Wine Committee to provide intoxicating liquor, food and other drinks for the Members

of Blackheath Harriers. The Wine Committee is automonous in its activities for most of the time, but mus render a report and financial statement at every Annua General Meeting.

Whilst this is the simplistic view of what is required of the Wine Committee, over the years there have beer gradual changes which have led to the income of the Wine Committee being used to finance the day to day running of the Club House. Thus from the income from meals we past the staff we employ, we pay the costs of gas and electricity and crockery and laundry – and on the principle that lots of drink will sooner or later be passed, we pay the water rate and cost of maintaining the cess-pit pumping system. In fact, the running of the Club House on a day to day basis, with occasional minor costs for refurbishing paintwork or plants for the gardens, is covered by the Wine Committee. There are separate accounts maintained by the Wine Committee Treasurer, and the Wine Committee has been registered for VAT for some years.

The main purpose of my letter is to clarify for people the argument that track members who never use the Club House pay the same subscription as cross-country runners who do, and they have less benefits. Similarly, older members living away from London never visit Haves, but pay a full subscription - as do overseas members. I would like people to appreciate that we all pay our level of subscription to fund Blackheath Harriers and its activities The Wine Committee can run the Club House from its income, so long as people use the facilities, buy drinks and support the suppers on Wednesday evenings and Saturdays where appropriate. Whilst support continues then those who use the facilities are paying their way, over and above their subscriptions. The active athletes will find themselves subsidised in their efforts at organised athletics over and above subscription levels, largely by non-active people who pay their subscriptions from sentiment or sheer pleasure at being a part of this great Club. It is only if we fail to make use of our facilities that we will have to re-think our situation

The Committee is currently reviewing the level of subscriptions, we have no choice; and whatever level we pitch the subscription at, there will not be enough money—there never is. As we approach the year 2000 we need to stay in the fore-front of athletics, and it will cost money. The modern way of achieving that affluence is through "sponsorship", a route avidly pursued by the Committee—but we need help from people who may have contacts in companies with the funds to support our sporting activity in return for publicity.

Until we achieve that goal, we will always need money, so please support our appeals when they occur, make donations if you have cash to spare, and use your Club House to

its best advantage so we can keep it going.

I hope this letter will clarify the situation for those people who wonder how the Club is run and financed and prompt everyone to pay subscriptions on time – 1st September each year.

BRITISH LEAGUE DIVISION ONE MATCH ONE

As in 1989, the opening fixture of the 1990 British League Division One season was dominated by another eligibility row, this time centred around Australian Andy Lloyd, the Commonwealth Games 5000m champion who was competing for Belgrave Harriers. This was however the least of team manager Andy Frankish's worries as surrounded by illness and injuries he struggled to turn out the sort of team needed to compete against the Haringey and Birchfield's of this world!

In the early field events we sadly missed the talents of Long/Triple Jumper Dwayne Heard currently working in the United States, and club Hammer record holder Nigel Spivey exiled in the wilds of North Wales. Their absence did however give two of the Club's young decathlete talents, Andy Hodge and Steve Hamson a chance to exhibit their all round abilities.

On the track we got off to a much more promising start, Nigel Keogh placed third in the 400m Hurdles "A" string whilst in the 800m "B" string Pete Lester clocked his fastest time for 5 years for fourth place. The star of the day was however, undoubtedly sprinter Mark Williams. In a blanket finish to the "A" string 100m he snatched second place

behind Belgrave's Lenny Paul. In the 200m "B" string he then went one better winning in a fine early season time of 21.5. He then finished a highly successful day by teaming up with Phil Davies, Garry Proctor and Rob Bates in the 4×100 m relay gaining third place.

In the longer track events Bill Foster, now a 2hr 19mins Marathon man, showed that he's still got some speed left in his legs when he placed second in the "A" string 1500m behind the controversial Lloyd. In the 5000m Spencea Newport couldn't quite match his winning feat in the opening fixture of last season when in a high quality field he placed fourth behind Paul Evans, Mark King and John Sherban. Newport was ably supported in the "B" string by Jerry Barton who although beaten by Shaftesbury stalwart Julian Goater held on for second ahead of Haringey's Steve Barris.

Elsewhere there were encouraging British league debuts from Pole Vaulter Alan Hardy and Steeplechaser Nick May, it was also gratifying to see two members of last year's winning young athletes team Jamie Quarry and Jason Mulcaby on first team duty.

All this was however insufficient to save us from a disastrous start to the season, eighth, eleven points behind seventh placed Old Gaytonians. At the top Haringey made the best possible start in their attempt to regain the league title with a comfortable win, whilst defending champions Birchfield could manage only fifth place.

Lawrence Rogers was another man in form, clearly benefiting from being put through his paces by club high jump record holder Trevor Llewelyn, Rogers became the second fastest junior in club history with a superb new personal best of 53.73. Another youngster in form was 15 year old Bassey Essien who although he could place only eighth in the "A" string triple jump, showed great promise with a new personal best of 13.85m. A further personal best was recorded by Pete Lester in the "B" string 800m, at last beginning to fulfil the potential he showed as a 16 year old, Lester clocked a fine 1.53.62, in a race which saw Thames Valley's former Great Britain International Peter Browne break the world veteran's record. Elsewhere the team battled hard but with limited success, Spencer Newport in the 1500m "B" string and Andy Hodge in the high jump "B" string being the only 'heathens to break into the top two. The quality of the match being emphasised by the fact that in the "A" string high jump Warren Caswell found a 2.10m only good enough for fourth.

In the chase for the league title Haringey further strengthened their position at the top with another convincing win, Birchfield being their closest rivals, they were however now five points adrift in the current league

standings.

Elsewhere there was very little to cheer about, only Colin Hamplett, who was just starting to hit form in time for the AAA Championships and Warren Caswell making the top three. A no height in the Pole Vault possibly costing us seventh place as we closed the gap between Old Gaytonians and ourselves to a mere four and a half points.

At the top another convincing Haringey Victory meant that the league championship trophy was virtually assured of a return to North London, with reigning champions Birchfield and Belgrave battling it out for the runners up spot.

Baldock being particularly worthy of praise having run the 5000m in three of the four league fixtures. Another to show commendable club loyalty throughout the season has been javelin thrower John Kitching, despite having recently started work as a house doctor, Kitching still found time to compete in all four league fixtures. He will however be sorely missed in 1991, having gone to work in Australia for the next eighteen months. In addition to Baldock, Hardy and Kitching, special mention must also be made of Messrs Byfield, Galloway and Newport who also competed in all four matches, Paul Byfield in fact competed in seven different events. Their's is the spirit on which next years promotion drive must be based.






Deangate

SOUTHERN LEAGUE DIVISION SEVEN MATCH ONE

Norman Park

5th May, 1990

Time was that you could turn up at a Southern League match safe in the knowledge that each stream of each event would have an athlete versed in that discipline who would perform when requested to and who could then spend the remainder of the proceedings relaxing, warming down and cheering on the rest of the team. There was always the odd multi-event specialist, the Colin Brands and Roger Ebbutts who would be available for two, three or even four events, but these were the exceptions, one event per person was the norm

Not so now! Despite the Club having almost 1,000 members, getting people to perform in the lower regions of the Southern League is a task of Herculean proportions. But those who do turn out, those who "give it a go" are guaranteed an afternoon of such varied athletic delights, that it will be many a year before their performances in cross-discipline events will fade from their memories (or their limbs!).

Take this, the first match of the Southern League Division 7, for instance. A baking hot day at Norman Park and competition from six other teams (Chesham failed to show). Half the fourth team drafted into the third team at the last minute, including vaulters, chasers and sprinters, and several "athletes" turning up on the off chance of doing a non-scoring event. By the end of the afternoon we had witnessed several performances of heroic proportions from the thirteen athletes in the squad and few could have predicted their degree of involvement that would be displayed over the course of the afternoon's events.

Take Paul Betts for instance — on the road to recovery after a bout of pneumonia — he tentatively ventured along to do a 110m Hurdles. For a warm up he did the 400m Hurdles and as a warm down — the 3000 Steeplechase, he also managed to squeeze in the 200m "B" as a speed session.

Steve Freemantle, a last minute recruit turned up and offered to do "anything", this turned out to be both Long and Triple Jumps, combined with Shot and a gruelling

5000m race. Simon Parsons was another of the six who each undertook four events covering the Long Jump, 100m, 200m and a leg of the 4 × 100m relay. Team manager, Jim Phelan, sidelined from his usual middle-distance performances by a mid-week calf injury, also managed to get in four events - Shot, Discus and Hammer as well as the oddest High Jump event ever witnessed at Norman Park, or perhaps anywhere else for that matter, where 11 of the 13 competitiors all cleared the same height, 1.20, and fractions had to be introduced into the scoring as a result of all "B" competitors clearing the same height. Mike Allen and David Grierson were the two other four-eventers; Mike taking in the 400m flat and Hurdles as well as the 100 and 400m relays, while David produced the only victory of the day by winning the "B" 400m as well as running the 100m and both relay events.

Old stager Ken Daniel somehow got away with just three events – the 800m, 1500m and Javelin, whilst Anthony Algeo performed well in both his outings. A third place in the 800m and a superb leg of the 4×400 m relay that saw him claw back a big differential in the second leg of what turned out to be an exciting finale.

Yet another who turned up to "have a go" was John Ashdown — a veteran cross-country runner who gained valuable points for us on his debut in the Shot and High Jump. Most welcome return to the track, though, must go to the appearance of Steve Green who, after six months of chemotherapy returned to Norman Park to help out and took third place in the "A" stream Javelin as well as running a leg of the 100m relay.

Of those who got away with a single performance, mention must go to veteran Hugh Morten, who on making his return to Southern League athletics after a gap of twenty years, produced an excellent 1500m to take third spot in the "A" race with 4:18.5. Adrian Musson interrupted an afternoon of building work to come and throw the Discus and Martin Athawes, a seasoned performer in all divisions of the Southern League, ran yet another useful 5000 metres.

"Last minute recruit of the day" award must go to Richard Morten, who was listening to the football results in the car park when an unforseen gap appeared in the Steeplechase ranks. He changed in an instant but unfortunately both divisions were run together and he missed the start. Undaunted, he remained in kit and ran the opening leg of the 4 × 400m relay, setting up a thrilling race in which the 'heath came through the field from 6th to 3rd.

His and the rest of the team's attitudes typify the spirit that makes the fourth team a viable concern. We came fourth out of the seven clubs involved, the only "D" team in the Southern League, and everyone who wanted to perform did so. Long may the spirit of "have a go" continue.

On arrival at the stadium we still had twenty of the fortyone slots in the programme to fill but the team spirit was such that by the end of the day we managed to occupy second spot out of six.



This success was followed up by two superb legs in the 100m and 400m relays – in the 100m he handed over the baton first to enable us to clinch second spot and in the 400m, a distance he claimed never to have run in his life, he clawed back three places with a superbly judged 52.85 to hand over in the lead. To conclude – he attempted the Discus where he finished 4th "A" with 26.14.

Accompanying him in his throwing exploits was another newcomer, this time a complete novice, in the shape of Phil Lonergan. Phil got a taste for the throws after a "chance" conversation with the team manager whilst out running. This was followed by one coaching session in all throwing events and then onto the real thing. Fourth in the "A" Hammer with 21.52 was quickly followed up by fourth in the "B" Shot 8.22 and fifth in the "B" Javelin 27.38. To round off the day he threw the Discus 21.18 for fourth place in the "B" making for an excellent debut as a throw specialist. Other notable performances came from juniors Neil Gardener and Matthew Pearson who cleaned up maximum points in the 200m. Neil also came first in the 100m, ran a leg of the 4 × 100m as well as taking second spot in the Long Jump, while Matthew contested both Relays.

Jim Day and John Robinson were the judges with extra duties; Jim winning the Vault with 3.00m with John gaining valuable points in the Triple Jump.

Peter Hamilton interrupted his holiday to gain second spot in both the "B" stream 800 and 1500 events with Hugh Morten trying his hand at 5000m. Hugh was extremely unlucky to meet such a high quality field on this very hot day, his 16.10 which would have won him this event on many other occasions only gained him fourth place in a race which was won in 15.37. Steve Green also met very good competition in the Javelin where his 31.18 only gained him sixth spot.

Paul Betts and Jim Phelan paired off for some unusual doubles, both jumping 1.20 in the High Jump, finishing fifth and fourth in the 400mH before taking maximum points in the Steeplechase. Paul also ran the "A" 110m Hurdles and took third spot in the 1500m whilst Jim chose the 5000m and Hammer to make up his quota for the afternoon.

Between them they quickly despatched the Pole Vault and High Jump where both discovered that it's easier to traverse the bar without the pole by recording jumps of a greater altitude at High, than at Vault! John went on to achieve the remarkable feat of competing in six events in total whilst continuing to act as field judge in the Long and Triple Jump (both of which he also took part in for good measure). Paul went on to pick up valuable points in the High Hurdles and 1500m before taking up his usual spot at the front of the Steeplechase field.

New recruits never get off lightly in Division 7, just as Ally Brown and Phil Lonergan had both been busy in the last meeting—so too was new signing Greg Stephens in this. He came along to do a "B" 100m and by the end of the afternoon had contested six events. Along with the "A" stream 100 and 200 and as well as both Relays, he was also introduced to the Shot and Javelin where again he took the "A" spot.

Our two juniors faired slightly better, but at least they had the advantage of doing their own events. Chris Huntley picked up valuable points at 800 and 1500 with two second places and also filled in with the obligatory two Relays and a 400 Hurdles. Steve Hough unfortunately had a pressing engagement and was only able to get a point in the Long Jump after an excellent second place in the 800 "A" before he had to leave. I hope she was worth it!

Mike Allen and Bob Minting were our other two stalwarts picking up valuable points in the shorter distances; both running the Relay double and almost taking maximum points in the 400m with a 1st and 2nd. Bob also got a third spot in the "B" 200, whilst Mike got stuck into the 400 Hurdles and Shot.

With only twelve men, injuries could have spelt disaster especially when Jim Phelan was already crocked and had to restrict himself to Hammer, Discus and Javelin, but when Mike Mahoney felt a recurrence of a leg injury after only one event the sprinters closed ranks and coped admirably by covering all of Mike's other commitments. Barry Mellish and Martin Athawes somehow escaped with only one event each, the very windy 5000m where the field was led by a Division 2 athlete behind whom struggled Hugh Jones Martin and Barry were a little further back but picked up seven out of the ten available points.

The athlete living closest to the stadium, Chris Lord, was of course last to arrive having got lost on route. He quickly made up for this tardiness by doing a quick hop, step and jump before gaining maximum points as "B" 'chaser, an event which ironically is becoming our "blue riband" as we seem to be able to take maximum points with a variety of competitors.

All in all, it wasn't the disaster it could have been, but only because seven athletes were prepared to contest 34 events between them. In the end only the "B" 110m Hurdles was left unfilled and on reflection 4th place out of 7 was a pretty good performance.

Making a welcome return to competitive athletics (and he will indeed be very welcome should he wish to compete for the 4th team at any point in the future) was Steve Gascoigne who picked up a total of 21 points from his five events. Having won the "B" Pole Vault, he then picked up maximum points in the Hammer, went on to throw 44.96 for 2nd spot in the Javelin and 10.50 for the same place in the Shot before completing the afternoon with an enthralling battle in the Discus in which every throw of his and the Bournemouth competitor gained a metre over the previous one. Had the Bournemouth man not dredged up a P.B. for his last effort we would have taken the match.

The Vets again made valuable contributions, as well as Jim Phelan and ken Daniel, Jim Day cleared 3 metres for 2nd place in the "A" pole vault and Bob Minting gained vital points with a superb 52.5 to take the "A" 400 and a 2:04.00 800 for second spot. He also contributed to both winning relays in what has proved to be a very successful debut season as a Vet.

Greg Stephens was again usefully employed taking 9 points out of 10 in the "A" 100 and 200 as well as three in the "B" Shot and the opening leg of the 4×100 . Also contributing in both 100m events was Paul Stack who

the "B". It was welcome back too to Norman Davidson who completed the double for victory in the "B" 400 Hurdles as well as taking part in the 400 Relay and gaining second spot in the "B" 400.

All in all it was a very successful season for our fourth team, finishing higher in their division than any other senior Blackheath team (Vets excluded). Of the six meetings with a total of 252 events to fill, only eight were pointless due to a missing competitor. Forty four athletes competed for the team throughout the season with a hard core of 9 appearing in at least three meetings. Mike Allen turned out in four, Steve Green in five and both Paul Betts and manager Jim Phelan turned in a 100% record.

Many thanks to all those who contributed so valuably throughout the season. With so very few field eventers we did remarkable well to finish in the top half of the league. With only one or two additions we could well gain promotion to Division Six next season. Please don't wait to be asked, all contributions are most welcome. See you on the 4th May for our first meeting of 1991.

JUNIOR'S SUMMARY 1990

The jigsaw is now complete! Well, not quite perhaps. We need some more coaches, a major sponsor, more officials, real ale at the club house, more cross country runners for the Kent League etc. etc....but, as far as the track is concerned a member can join the club as a colt, move through the Young Athletes' ranks and now find the perfect bridge to the senior ranks. The 1990 season was the Club's first year of having a junior team.

The transition from young athlete to senior has been a minefield for some time. Saturday working; the problems of having to adapt to the use of much heavier senior implements; and the shock for 16 or 17 year olds of suddenly being thrown into competition against athletes twice their age, have all conspired to dampen the enthusiasm and motivation of our younger members. Faced with the consequent high drop-out rate of youngsters a National Junior League was set up by Old Gaytonians.

Sixteen teams took part in the first Junior League season in 1989 with Old Gaytonians finishing champions. Fixtures took place on Sundays and Bank Holidays and junior implements were used. By 1990 around forty clubs had applied to join the league which meant a restructuring of the competition. A National Division One was established containing six clubs and two regional second divisions were set up, one covering the South and one the Midlands and North. Blackheath in their first year in the league were placed in Division Two South along with our great rivals in National Young Athletes' League fixtures, Shaftesbury and Enfield. It promised to be an interesting season.

Having a junior team is undoubtedly going to strengthen our senior side. Already Messrs Quarry, Mulcahy, Rogers, Samuel, Harrison, Eldred, Bulson, Baker and Leishman have all competed for the British League team along with youths Brewster and Essein. Every one of them competed with distinction. During the course of the year from September to September the number of Blackheath Harriers eligible to compete in track and field fixtures as juniors increased from 47 to 62, an increase of over 30%. It is hoped that numbers and standards will continue to improve. A large proportion of the teams in 1990 were first year juniors or younger so there is much more to come next year. Next season we will be challenging for the National Junior title. Come and give the team your support.

JUNIOR LEAGUE MATCH ONE

We could hardly have asked for better conditions than those at Copthall for our first appearance in the Junior League. The sun was beating down and there was barely a breath of wind. Nor could we have asked for a better start than Laurence Roger's new league record of 55.9 in the opening track event, the 400m Hurdles. He was soon followed into the record books by Jonathan Murray, who took the 800m "B" race by the scruff of the neck and lead from gun to tape to record, what was then, the fastest time in the country by a youth of 1.55.8. Needless to say, it was our second League record in half an hour.

In the 400m, Ben Eldred took full advantage of the warm. still conditions to finish off his preparations for the forthcoming Kent AAA. He ran smoothly and easily to win in 51.2 and, given the speed with which he recovered, it was obvious that there was a lot left still to come.

Looking for some speed work, Jamie Quarry opted for the 100m and 200m and although beaten by the specialists into 3rd and 4th place respectively, his times of 11.3 and 23.2 were encouraging for his move to the high hurdles, an event which requires both strength and speed. His 2.50 metre pole vault though, was perhaps more telling. A natural in every respect, Jamie is now beginning to smooth the edges of his techniques in the disciplines that go to make up the Decathlon. Surely it is here that his vast potential will eventually be realised.

In the field we were scoring in both the jumps and the throws. Jason Mulcahy (14.66m) and Richard Samuel (12.33m) picked up maximum points in the Shot while Gary Murphy (1.80m) and Len Redgrave (1.65m) were first and second in their strings of the High Jump. In the Hammer, Steve Timmins, still only a youth, threw the 6.25kg implement 38.24m for third. Steven is improving technically all the time under the guidance of Mike Davies and will surely be a force to be reckoned with after a few more winters' hard work.

The conditions may have been perfect for the sprinters and field eventers but were perhaps slightly too humid for the middle distance boys, where the times were down all round. However, both Liam Bulson and Jonathan Murray ran well-judged races to get second in their 1500m races. while the two Steves (Hough and Povey) took second and third in the 3000m, while Anthony Algeo and Steve Hough (again) both managed second in the 2000m Steeplechase.

While exams, illness and injury almost certainly contributed to our weakened team for the second fixture, it was the non-appearance on the day of a number of athletes which was most disappointing. It is a pity that a small minority show such a lack of respect for their fellow athletes and the team management that they, without warning, fail to turn up to compete. One 'phone call is all it takes

When a team is weakened it is invariably the technical events which suffer first and so it was the case with us here and it is all credit to the likes of David Grierson, Anthony Algeo (both scoring points in the Pole Vault, a little more than thirty minutes after having picked up a pole for the first time ever) and Simon Leishman and Paul Ryan who gained points for us in the Triple Jump, despite primarily being throwers (they both came second in the "B" strings of the Javelin and Discus respectively.)

Luckily the Pole Vault and Triple Jump were our only really weak events and the rest of the field eventers did us proud. Wins for Jamie Quarry and Gus Singer in the Long Jump and nothing lower than third for our throws squad of Jason Mulcahy, Richard Samuel, Simon Leishman and Paul Ryan was most encouraging.

On the track it was first time over the ten sticks of the 400m Hurdles for David Grierson (4th in the "A" string with 62.2 sees) and Chris Huntley (4th in the "B" string with 65.3 sees). David returned later to scale hurdles three inches higher in the 110m event to fill in for Jamie Quarry, who had pulled a muscle during the Long Jump.

The sprints in particular were of a high standard and first year youth. Michael Narty, had rather too much ground to make up after an indifferent start in the 100m and his 11.4 secs was not a true reflection of his ability, as we were to be shown later in the year in the English Schools. In the "B" string, Jon Tullet ran a gutsy 11.6 secs for fourth place before spending the rest of the afternoon curled up in his car revising for two A-level exams the following day. The 200m again saw Narty away slowly but a good bend and strong running down the straight brought him home third in 22.7. A new personal best of 22.9 was something of a pleasant surprise for Laurence Rogers in the "B" string. He certainly didn't look as though he had it in him as he walked rather unsteadily over to the start some twenty minutes after his 50.5 personal best in the "B" 400m. There is nothing in the rules that says you have to look smooth and in control to run your fastest, Laurence certainly wasn't, and rugged determination brought him home in his fastest time ever in third place.

Just before the 200m, Ben Eldred oozed confidence in his 400m, after his first 50 second clocking in the recent Kent Junior Championships, winning as he pleased in 50.8 secs. Our only other individual track win came from Simon Cole in the 800m, who kicked with great effect from 150m out to win in 1.59.0. Behind him, Anthony Algeo ran very strongly to pick up second in the "B" string with 2.03.2.

Throughout the afternoon events where we were coming second and third in the first fixture saw us coming fourth and fifth. Not surprisingly then, Enfield did not need to be asked twice and took every opportunity to pile up the points and by the final event were uncatchable. However undaunted the $4\times400\text{m}$ squad did their stuff and Simon Cole (52.5), Nick Woodworth (53.6), Laurence Rogers (52.0) and Ben Eldred (49.9) put on a formidable display coming home in 3.26.0, only half a second outside the League record.

The final result meant that after two matches we were level at the top of Division Two with Enfield on eleven points and, with only one team to be promoted, we had to beat Enfield in the final match if we were to make it into Division One for next year.

Blackheath used to hold its Club Championships at Croydon arena on a circular track that, more often that not, was the consistency of sand when dry and porridge when wet. All that has changed and the new eight-lane tartan track is splendid indeed. An appropriate setting then for the last fixture of the season and one in which Blackheath had to beat Enfield in order to gain promotion to Division One.

The first track event of the day saw the welcome return to racing for Richard Holt who had been sidelined for several months with glandular fever. His victory in the 400m Hurdles in 56.9 secs must have been very satisfying indeed, after many frustrating months when he could do little more than jog. In the "B" string event all credit must go to Stephen Povey, who was drafted into the event quite literally at the last minute when Noel Levy pulled a muscle while warming up.

In the 800m Liam Bulson and Simon Cole picked up valuable points and although Liam was out-kicked down the home straight there was much to suggest that he is well on the way back to full fitness. Simon Cole took the "B" string by the scruff of the neck and, although the Enfield runner was closing fast at the line, Simon's strength carried him

hrough.

After his success over 800m throughout the season Jonathan Murray stepped up a distance to the Metric Mile but, perhaps after a summer's heavy racing programme could not hold the stronger Enfield over the last lap. He looked much more at home later in the $4\times400\mathrm{m}$ where he contributed in no small way to the League record equalling performance.

The report of the track events cannot end without mentioning Anthony Draper and Roger Lashley for their wins in the "A" string 3000m and "B" string 400m, both are youths and eligible for the Junior team for two or three

years yet.

In the field, no member of the team finished lower than third in either string and it was this consistency that helped enormously throughout the afternoon to swell our points score. Jason Mulcahy again scored heavily, winning the "A" string Shot and "B" string Discus, while Barry Essein piled up the points in the Pole Vault (2nd "B" string), High Jump

(2nd "B" string) and Triple Jump (1st "B" string). Perhaps one of the most impressive performances of the afternoon came from Jamie Quarry in the Pole Vault. His 3.50m personal best was excellent and at last he is beginning to look comfortable in the event. 4.00m and more cannot be far away.

Our 4×100 m performance lacked, as it has done all season, sparkle, although the 45.1 we ran was the quickest of the season. By then, however, we were virtually home and dry, but it was terrific to see the 4×400 m quartet go for the League record with real commitment. However, Roger Lashley (51.6), Jonathan Murray (51.5), Ben Eldred (51.3) and Richard Holt (51.2) were desperately unlucky not to run 0.1 seconds faster. If they had, the record would be theirs alone, as it was the 3.25.6 equalled the existing record. Next year we will get it.

As winners of Division 2 South we automatically gain promotion to the First Division next year, where we will meet the likes of Haringey, Middlesborough and Old Gaytonians. Very few of the team leave the Junior ranks next year and with the Youths who leave the victorious Young Athletes' team, the prospects look very good indeed. Watch this space.

Jamie Quarry gave up an international vest to take part in this end of season decathlon. The sacrifice proved worthwhile as not only did he win but he also set a number of personal bests, broke the championship record, and led to victory the Kent team which was made up entirely of Blackheath Harriers.

The personal bests came in the 400m, Discus and Pole Vault. The Vault was probably the greatest improvement, his best before the competition being 3.40. Now having concentrated on some serious Vault training in recent weeks he cleared 3.70 and shows all the signs of clearing 4 metres in the near future. Other events to note were another 7.00m Long Jump, a 1.95 High Jump and a 14.8 over the Hurdles. His total point score was a 217 improvement on the previous championship best, and that best was the top Decathlon of last year for juniors using junior

implements. It was an excellent all round performance which promises great things for himself, his club and his country in the coming years.

Second in the event was another Blackheath Harrier. The name Alexis Sharpe may not be familiar to that many people but take a look at the club's record board and at the 80m Hurdles record, you will see one A. Sharpe 12.9. Having dropped out of the club for a few years he is now back in the fold and should be making a vital contribution to the club in league fixtures. His best event at Birmingham was probably the Javelin where he became the fourth Blackheath junior this year to break the 50 metre barrier. Other events were all of a high quality with only perhaps the Pole

Vault and possibly the High Jump being a little below par. Blackheath and Kent's third competitor was Steve Harrison who never actually finished the event because by the time the Javelin ended he could hardly move as a shoulder injury was giving him such pain. By this time, however, the championship was already assured for Kent and he could afford the luxury of sitting out the 1500m. Had he been able to compete in the last event he would probably have finished fourth overall. His best events were the Javelin, Discus and Sprint Hurdles.

Most clubs would be happy to have just one class Decathlete. To have three is a huge resource for a club. Like the buses, you spend ages waiting for one to come along and then three arrive at once.

In the intermediate boys Octathlon Noel Levy competing for London Schools finished sixteen with 4238 points.




EUROPEAN JUNIOR CLUBS' CUP

Copthall

Sat. 29th September, 1990

The club has had many sorties into Europe in recent years in cross country, road and track and field fixtures but the most prestigious competition in which we have taken part undoubtedly came on an overcast and muggy day in North London. As a result of winning the 1989 National Youth Athletics Final, Blackheath Harriers Junior Team were nominated by the BAAB to be Great Britain's representatives at the 1990 European Junior Clubs' Cup. The only slight disappointment was that after all our youngsters' endeavours they should be rewarded with a meeting at Copthall rather than the more exotic venues of the South of France or Greece. Competition for places in the team was tough with it only being one string per event. The team was weakened by the absense, on holiday, of Jason Mulcahy and Derek Baker and then by the loss of Liam Bulson, with wisdom tooth problems, and Bassey Essein with a broken arm. Had we had the services of such athletes we would have undoubtedly done even better than we did. Fifteen teams took part in the fixtute with the races being split into A and B events where necessary and the times then combined to give a final position.

Toby Walter has spent most of the summer doing A levels and recovering from strained ligaments in his hand, an injury which occurred five minutes from the end of his last ever school's rugby match. Now he has had a year off before going to university and will have plenty of time to get in some proper training with the likes of Steve Timmins, Peter Kane and Neil Haffenden. At Copthall, competition in the Hammer was of top quality with Neumann of West

In some of the other field events we were also "up against t". Looking at the programme, the Pole Vault featured two 5.20 vaulters, two 4.90, one 4.80 and a further four over 4 netres. Our hopes lay with first year youth Steven Foster, who missed most of the season through injury. It was herefore one of the surprises of the afternoon for Steven to ichieve seventh place with 3.20 as no fewer than six thletes no heighted. No doubt with a full season next year iteven will also be around the four metre mark. Shot Putter tichard Samuel, replacing the holidaying Jason Mulcahy, vas also going to find it difficult gaining points and without ellow competitors no throwing he finished twelfth with 10.27. Spare a thought also for Guy Murphy in the high ump. His personal best is 1.93m set two years ago (best this ear of 1.85). He was up against Dragutin Topic the world unior record holder and European champion whose personal best is a mere 44cm higher than Guy's. Guy went out at 1.80 and perhaps this will convince him of the need o do some training. The gap between him and Topic was lowever, reduced to only 40cm as the Yugoslav was also competing and winning in the triple jump at the same time.

Our man in the triple jump was Ezra Clarke who came lose to his best with 13.22m in ninth place. Ezra is still a outh next year and no doubt Jamie Quarry's club record of 4.27 will be under threat from both him and Sam Bobb lext season. Mr Quarry, himself, as always on the big occasion was thriving on the top competition. On best performances his 7.09 only ranked him sixth in the Long

although he was disappointed with fourth it should be remembered that he is still only a first year youth and he had only just recovered from a broken bone in the foot which he ran with in the National Young Athletes final. In the 200m he was put in the B race but his time was fast enough to gain him sixth overall position.

Steve Harrison has seemingly been carrying injuries all season but that hasn't stopped him competing. It was a surprise to some that he made this fixture at all after being unable to complete the 1500m in the English Schools Decathlon. He showed no ill effects however and gained a useful sixth place in the Javelin with his 55.12 being close to his personal best. On paper he was tenth ranked. He did, however, achieve a personal best in the Discus with 34.46 in eighth.

Another athlete to gain a personal best was Anthony Algeo, who took eight seconds off his previous best time in the 2000m Steeplechase to finish ninth, a just reward for some dedicated training over the Winter and Summer months. Training partners Jonathon Murray and Anthony Draper were, however, a little below par at the end of a hard season. Jonathon was with the pace in the 800m up until 200 metres to go but was then unable to kick with the leaders. This was the first and only time he was beaten over 800m this year. Again it was a case of youth against juniors and he can pride himself in being the fastest youth in the country this year and unbeaten against other youths. Draper in the 1500m stayed with the pace for the first two laps but then faded to finish some way off his best of 4.08. Looking at him being dwarfed by some of the other runners it is hard to believe he has now left school and is in gainful employment. Our other middle distance athlete was Mark Steinle who came in for Liam Bulson. He responded by coming within four seconds of his personal best in the 3000m in what were not ideal conditions and at a time when he was having a break prior to commencing winter training. He finished in an excellent sixth place.

Blackheath has a fine tradition of 400m running and flying the flag for the club at Copthall was Ben Eldred, the current Kent Junior Champion who has had an excellent season. 50.86 was not his best time but he "went for it" and suffered over the 80 metres. If he'd run a second faster he'd still have come sixth. He also ran the fastest split for the club in the 4×400 which was the closest we came to winning an event all day. We led until 5 metres from the line to be pipped by .05 secs by the West German team. Still, the team of Eldred, Rogers, Murray and Richard Holt (absent for most of the year with glandular fever) recorded a fine time of 3.21.74 which is almost certainly the fastest time of the year in the country by a junior club team, but still half a second slower than the club junior record. In the 4 × 100m an all youths team of Narty, Richard Lansiquot and Barry and Neil Gardner came a surprisingly high fourth, a fraction slower than the club record they set at the Kent

Relay Championships.

All these performances contributed to a fine sixth place, notable for the fact that Richard Holt was the only member of the team not eligible to compete as a junior next year. Having gained promotion to Division One of the National Junior League and retained the National Young Athlete's title we are strongly fancied to be Britain's representitives in this competition next season and with the squad we have there is no reason why we should not win it.

On an afternoon of such great athletic achievement by members of the club there was one great disappointment. The number of athletes in our squad on the day probably equalled, if not outnumbered the number of supporters. The fixture was entered on both Summer and Winter fixture cards and publicised at the Club House well in advance. The Club House was even closed specifically on this day to encourage our members to support their club team. Apart from a small number of loyal clubmen, the turn out was dire. Obviously there was a clash with the Southern relays for seniors and veterans (in fact we never fielded a senior team) but this was no excuse for the majority of members to ignore this unique moment in the club's history. For those who did not attend, our lads did the club proud.

KENT CHAMPIONSHIPS

Crystal Palace

19th/20th May 1990

The Kent Championships must be one of the best organised county championships in the country. It consists of two days of action packed athletics at the National Stadium at Crystal Palace, for Seniors, Juniors and Youths in the men; second, was also inside the previous championship best. With Noel Levy comfortably taking the Youths title the clean sweep of victories was secured.

Elsewhere on the track, as far as Seniors were concerned, it was a case of fair representation but not much for the silverware cabinet. After running 10.80 in the qualifying round Phil Davies was unable to defend his 100m title due to injury. In the 200m Nigel Keogh was a good second place and first of our four finalists. Paul Galloway ran an excellent 1:53.80 but only came in sixth in the 800m in a race won in 1:48.40 by former European Indoor 800m champion, Steve Heard. Matt Lawton came a good third in the 1500 in his first year as a Senior, while Tony Baldock came very close to breaking 15 minutes for the first time in the 5000m.

On the field it was a case of spot the Blackheath Harrier. It was very worrying to see us fielding competitors in only two of the eight field events. Apart from Andy Hodge's efforts our only other representation came in the Pole Vault where Iim Day came 5th and the remarkable David Coleman continued his comeback after being advised by doctors to give up the event because of back injury. Hopefully the lack of field eventers was due to the injuries which plagued us all season and people not getting their entries in on time.

As well as his win in the 400 Hurdles, Jamie Quarry was to feature heavily in a number of other events. Most notable was his smashing of the championship best in the 110 Hurdles from a standing start. He also achieved a p.b. with second place in the 100m and putt 11.79 to take second in the Shot. Ben Eldred also set a couple of p.b.'s as he convincingly took the 400m breaking 50 seconds for the first time. His other p.b. came in the 200m. One of the most interesting events of the weekend was the Iunior Javelin where the Club appears to be developing some strength in depth amongst our younger age groups. Here Simon Leishman, Stephen Harrison and Richard Samuel, (all 50 metre plus men and British League athletes by the end of the season), fought a good contest, with Harrison throwing the best to take second with 53.80. Also of note were p.b.'s of Simon Cole in the 800 (1:57.60) and Anthony Algeo (4:14.80) in the 1500. While there was a reasonable showing of juniors, a number of athletes who had been sent entry forms failed to enter themselves and undoubtedly missed out on County medals as a result.

Seven County gold medals were won in the Youths events. Michael Narty went under 11 seconds to clock 10.90 and beat Norman Ellis, his close rival from G.E.C. Avionics. Michael is only a first year youth and was only fourteen on the day of the final. There was a fine 400 and 800m double from Jonathon Murray who was totally in control of both races. Other wins came from Ezra Clarke (Triple Jump), Justin Goodman (Pole Vault) and Stephen Timmins (Hammer). Clarke's 13.13 was a personal best and a deserved reward for a athlete who has come back from a serious bike accident last winter.

Last year, for the first time ever, we won the Sward and Kinnaird Trophies at Kingston and Polytechnic's annual trophy meeting. Much to our surprise we did it again. The fixture still seems to be searching for the right weekend in an ever congested fixture card. This year because of upgrading of the Norbiton track, the provisional April date was moved to September, the same weekend as the Kent Relays. By this stage of the season, having already had to pull out of the Woodford meeting because of a major clash of fixtures and injuries, we were happy just to get out in action a small group of athletes who were still looking for competition rather than making a big push to retain the trophies. We had the people to fill the field events, but covering the track looked impossible.

After three track events, however, we looked around at the standard of competition from the other clubs and the quality of the athletes we'd brought and decided that if we could cover the rest of the events we'd be up with the leaders. In the more technical track events, the 110H, 400H and 2000 Steeplechase we took five wins and a second place. Richard Holt and Martin Lobb both did five events and their example was followed by all other members of the team as we clawed back the points deficit on Mitcham and Sutton to win by sixteen points. In the 2000m Steeplechase Anthony Algeo had a good warm up for the European Junior Clubs by running a p.b. of 6.32.3 to win the "B" string.

In the Sward Trophy our hopes took a blow at the start when Steve Oxlade, back from travelling around the world, injured himself in the Pole Vault, thus reducing his level of participation in other events. He still managed to do the Long Jump, Discus, Shot and Javelin. After a season of being injured it was a relief to see Andy Jamieson competing without breaking down again. Andy is a 14 metre Triple Jumper and would undoubtedly have been of value to us in the British League team in 1990. Outstanding field event performance of the afternoon came from Lee Redgrave who

added over 30cm to his previous best to win the Long Jump in the last round with a leap of 6.65m. This made him the unth Blackheath Harrier to jump further than 6.50m in 1990, and that does not include Dwayne Heard who is currently in America. Of those nine, seven have been niured at various times during the year.

Next season this fixture will take place in April. As well as agving scoring "A" and "B" string events, there is also non-coring in all events. So mark this fixture down as one of four warm up meetings for the start of next season, and contact a track official to let him know of your interest. 18th September, 1990



A NOTABLE ANNIVERSARY

On 29th June, 1900, young Eric Reed entered this world. On Friday, 29th June, this year therefore he reached his ninetieth birthday and seeing that for 67 of those years he has been not only a member but a whole hearted and constant supporter of every aspect of the club's life—indeed a club institution in his own right—the occasion demanded a fitting celebration. This took the form of a luncheon at Hayes at which the President had gathered a company of Eric's fellow 'heathens to do him honour.

He arrived from Morden College in Phil Saxon's car soon after 12 and it was good to see that he looked very little different from how we remembered him and how he appears in groups in the club room from the 1920's onwards. Unfortunately he can only walk with the aid of a zimmer and uses an electric wheelchair to move around the college buildings, but by way of the fire escape he was duly installed in the club room among his old friends and some younger ones who were cager to meet him. After a flood of greetings and reminiscences 39 sat down to an excellent lunch after which PP Tony Oldfield proposed Eric's health recalling his seemingly unending career as a competitive runner. He was one of the first to receive a 50 year membership award and is possibly the only one to have been an active athlete at the time. In the Club Five in

Centenary Year he had 12 behind him and four years later in the same event, aged 73, there were still five behind him It was appropriate therefore that PP Johnnie Walker, always eager to recruit fresh blood for his team of geriatrics in the Sunday Times Fun Run had thoughtfully provided an entry form for Eric in this year's event!

PP Ken Johnson then read greetings and comments from those who had been unable to come. In his note VP John Lissaman drew attention to another aspect of Eric's services to the club: his friendliness and willingness to talk to young and old alike. At John's first track meeting everybody seemed too busy officiating or competing to have time for a new junior, but Eric was there with a few words of encouragement. John could never keep up with him over the country despite being nearly forty years younger but greatly enjoyed his company in warm-up sessions on the track.

When the President invited reminiscences from the assembled company the many contributions testified to the extent to which Eric had captured the hearts of members as a runner, for his ever friendly encouragement and not least as a musician. A photograph of Eric at the piano, Frank Rogers turning the pages of the music and PP Cecil Pollard in full flight rendering "Brown Boots" brought back vivid memories of Smoking Concerts of former days*. This led naturally to the conclusion of the function when the President presented Eric with a Yamaha Electronic Keyboard and invited him to give us a few bars of "Brown Boots", which he duly did — to electronic beat accompaniment!

So ended a memorable occasion, greatly enjoyed by all present.

BRUGES 10K ROAD RACES

23rd June, 1990

The Flanders city of Bruges is one of the most beautiful cities in Europe. Apparently unspoilt by the rigours of the 20th century and one that would even delight the Prince of Wales as far as architecture is concerned. They annually host the 10km road races at the end of June and for the truly masochistic who have not yet discovered the delights of a Saturday night's drinking in Bruges there is a longer race on Sunday. Racing on a Sunday seems a bit of a waste of time to me as it supposedly negates the Saturday night but suffice to say that none of the party of 'heathens present in Bruges on this weekend elected to race on Sunday.

Never mind the delays caused by those inconsiderate French people at Calais. They were not going to spoil our weekend. The seven hour wait at Dover seemed to take no longer than twelve hours and within no time at all we were on our way. Even though we were boarding the ferry at 01.30 on Saturday morning it only meant that we were a bit late as we were due to arrive in Bruges at 23.10 the day before. So we arrived at 06.40, inconvenient maybe but we were here to run and a sound sleep of 2 and a half hours was enough for us, at least that's what we said to ourselves.

One of us made breakfast and piled up the croissants in case anyone else made it. In the end there were two of us in there and a pile of croissants eventually made it up to the second floor much to the annoyance of the hotel management. The shopping trip to the supermarket and a couple of Beer Specialist stores followed and soon we were ready for the race, after all, it was one of the reasons we came here. This year there was a 10km race for seniors, usually this being a Veterans' Festival. Four of our party were to race this event, Tony Baldock, Damon Williams, Van Hamlin and guesting Michael Thorne (not at this time a 'heathen but check back later). A field of about 80 assembled and the jokes regarding the identity of the runner in the red tracksuit proved prophetic as it turned out to be Kip Koskei. Two runners elected to go with him, most did not . . . ours did not. Tony Baldock stayed in the following bunch for the whole race, contesting third to sixth positions. Eventually he placed fifth according to the result sheet but we were sure that he finished sixth. We won't argue though. Damon Williams ran one of his better races to finish seventh. His performance in the Pepper race indicated that he was in form over this type of distance and this was proved here. Our guest came in 16th but we waited until 39th for Van Hamlin to finish. On target for a sub-40 he became tired nearing the stadium and had to ease off. However, this was good enough to account for first place in the team race ahead of AC Bruges, and I am willing to bet that they were in bed long before 06.40 in the morning!

The Veterans? Well, the field was a lot bigger and our two runners were as pleased as their form allowed them to be. In the over 45 race Ian Wilson placed 6th in 37.10 and Mick Hamlin elected to run through from the back to place 20th, a fair amount slower. But the weekend was just about to

start.

Our athletic endeavours finished, we set about the cultural part of our visit. With 1992 approaching, I personally feel it is of utmost importance to get to grips with the European way of life. Bruges has two breweries and our first call was at the Halve Maan Brewery situated conveniently close to our hotel. Their Straffe Hendrick brew is a classic "summer weight" drink that slips down easily in the right circumstances. Following a shower we set about catching up on the Flanders lifestyle. The Americans, in their quaint way that endears themselves to those of us more intellectually endowed than themselves, would have said we were on a "programme" (or perhaps a "program"). We began with the Gueuze, a blended style of lambic from the Senne Valley just southwest of Brussels. Following that we dealt with a bowl of spaghetti bolognaise and a Golden Carolus (brewed at Mechelen). A change of scenery led us then to the Markt where we stayed outside for the Liefmans Kriek (a beer brewed over cherries registering a tasty 7.2%). Night began to set in about this time so it was time to go indoors. At the Bruges Beertje they claim to stock about 300 brews and we started with the draught wheat beer (Bruges Tarweibier) brewed at the other Bruges brewery. Another plate of spaghetti bolognaise, totally different from the first, before we ended the evening with the famous Bruges Tripel at a hefty 9.5%. All of us feel more at ease about joining Europe now and feel a bit more in line with the European way of life.

So what could we do the next day? Actually it was already the next day, so we slept a few hours and then we took a leisurely trot round the town, (well, some did). This was followed by a leisurely drive out to Esen on the way home.

There is not too much at Esen, just about two cafes, a church, a chemist and a brewery. De Dolle Brewerij is run on a weekend basis by three brothers and their mother. The brothers bought the brewery when the owner fell ill in 1980 when they were students. They brewed four times a year then. This has gone up to 44 times a year now and the

students are no longer. Kris (now an architect) was pleased to meet us and that his product was known in Britain. Ian and I were there last year and we sat on the verandah and supped the luscious Oerbier then and will no doubt return to do the same another time. Between us we boosted his Sunday sales by 100 bottles on this day.

Another brew in Veurne and a spaghetti bolognaise (an even better variety some thought, they were all different) and we were on our way to Boulogne for the trip home. This was no quick affair but at least we could slip in from time to time to catch up on the Holland v. West Germany game. We got back at about 3.00am. Book now for Bruges 1991. At only 22, Gary Arthey ran the socks off international rivals in this year's Great North Run, setting a UK best time for his age in what was the fastest half marathon ever run.

The televised race from Newcastle to South Shields incorporating the AAA half-marathon championship, was the nation's largest athletic event, with 30,000 runners and was won by Steve Moneghetti in 60.34 from Douglas Wakiihuri in 60.42. Gary was some three minutes behind in eighth spot with a time of 63.49 on what was a perfect day for running.

OBITUARY

A.E. KEEPAX

We were saddened to learn of the death of Albert Keepax after a long illness. His first connection with the Club came during the war when the Club was host to the London Fire Force and he showed his potential in 1942 in an inter-club match when he finished second. Thereafter he was rarely less than third in other matches through to 1945. After the war he joined the Club in 1946 and was gladly accepted as a "'Heathen". On March of that year in the ECCU Championships he was 61st, being the 4th scoring man for the Club. Again in the SLH match he was 9th, being but one second behind Sydney Wooderson. In December in the Ranelagh match he was 5th behind Choat, Reynolds and Wooderson "in distinguished company" as the Gazette commented.

His redoubtable and consistent running was evidenced throughout his career, finishing 7th in the Inter-Vets match and again the Gazette pronounced it "a very fine run on one of his unfortunately rare appearances for the Club". He continued his career in the Fire Service, winning the LFB Cross-Country Championships in 1949, 1950 and 1951. In 1967 he was one of eight runners representing England in the International Veterans' Cross-Country at Bussen, Holland, gaining second place in the 50-59 group.

Continuing his club loyalty, he ran regularly in the Mob matches and occasionally in the Club 5 – our Veterans match and as late as 1967. In 1968 he retired, settled at Tonbridge, but would usually make a special effort to get to Hayes for the SLH match, in which his last run was in 1976, followed by a final run in the "Orion" in December that year, at the age of 68 years. A reticent and retiring man, he was very much a family man and did not mingle much in the Club's social functions as his service duties intervened. Known now by few current members, he will never the less be a vivid memory for those who ran with, and often behind

We extend our sympathy to his widow and daughter in their sad loss.
